This new facility has come at the perfect time!. We now have a garden full of enthusiastic members, cultivating their own plots and helping with the communal tasks. We have also been able to welcome a class of Year 2 children from St. Paul's Primary School. They are participating in a programme, the "Forest School", organised by the Excellence Cluster which will introduce them to the pleasures of Summerfields Wood and the walled garden within it. St. Paul's School has been allocated a large plot next to the one used by St. Mary's Star of the Sea School, so more and more local children will have the benefit of growing their own food in this idyllic setting.

Katharine Slater has been liaising with St. Pauls's School to provide some stimulating outings. Katharine says that the children will be "learning about biodiversity through play. All activities will be taught in the Forest School context of a a 'can do, hands on' attitude, which foster confidence and develop creative thinking skills, through nurtured support. We are all very excited to be incorporating vegetable planting as one of our activies in the secret walled garden. This ties in wonderfully to the the Year Two science topic of 'plants and growing'. When the ten-week Forest School course has finished, St. Paul's teaching staff will hopefully feel confident enough and inspired to bring more groups to the Walled Garden to continue working on their plot and grow, grow, grow!!!"
